Auslan



On Friday 3rd May, RHPS were lucky enough to be visited by the lovely team from Auslan Education Services: Naomie (who is deaf), her interpreter, Melissa and another presenter, Mel.

Naomie was so engaging. It was **so** interesting and inspiring to hear her life story and what it was like for her growing up deaf. She lost her hearing when she was only 19 months old.

Growing up, Naomie's closest friend was her brother, who is also deaf. She sadly shared about being bullied when she was little because she wasn't the same as her peers, but she was grateful to have her brother by her side as a friend.

Unfortunately, because they grew up in the country, there weren't many other deaf

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people to connect with, or services available for support. <u>Thankfully</u>, there is a *large* deaf community in Melbourne, which is one of the reasons Naomie chose to live here as an adult.

Some of the most interesting things that we learnt about Naomie and her day to day life include:

- * She can sign EXTREMELY FAST! Zoe P, Nia and Harvey gave her a good challenge though with a fingerspelling race!
- * Her sign name means "shy", because she was shy when she was little.
- * It was harder for her to learn to spell growing up because she couldn't use sounds of words like we do.
- * Her mum taught her Auslan.
- * She has to book appointments around having an interpreter available, but going to the shops is usually ok.



During the session, some students even got to come up and ask Naomie questions, putting their Auslan skills into practice! For questions that were too hard for us to sign, Naomie's interpreter helped us out.

One *very* important thing we learned on the day of Naomie's visit was that: if you're ever communicating to a deaf person through an interpreter, make sure you make *eye contact* with the *deaf person*, and <u>not</u> their interpreter, as the interpreter is only there to <u>translate</u> on your behalf. Please remember this in future.

Having Naomi visit last week really helped us understand why Auslan is such a wonderful second language for us to learn and how proud we are to be part of creating a more inclusive place to live!

On Friday the 3rd of May, some people from Auslan Education Services came to our school for an incursion. We met Mel, Naomie, who is a Deaf person, and her interpreter Melissa. We had so much fun learning about the perspective of a Deaf person and how it affects Naomie's life.

We had so many wonderings and questions about her life, which Naomie generously answered. We even played some fun activities like: guess the sign, fingerspelling race, introducing ourselves in Auslan and a few more.

There were some moments where we felt sorry for the experiences that Naomie had as a Deaf child like being bullied by others and struggling to be able to communicate with her friends and family.

We would like to say thank you to Auslan Education

Services for coming in and sharing with us, we had such a fun time!

11/4/1914

I'm going to war. I'm really excited. I don't know why I'm needed here, but I'm here. Someone has to be a nurse.

24/4/1914

I've seen a lot of bloody stuff. I now know why I'm needed. Patients come in all around the clock, so I refuse to take breaks.

1/5/1914

I really want to run out there and stop this all! Too many people are dying. At this stage I don't care who wins, as long as this fighting stops.

5/5/1914

I'm really tired. I've had no sleep for weeks. I've just read a letter from home - I'm so depressed. Knowing that my family is out there crying for me to come home makes it even worse.
